Course Description

Overview of aural rehabilitation and methods in auditory training and speech reading with hearing-impaired individuals. [3 credits hours]

Course Pre-Requisites / Co-Requisites

Pre-requisite: SPA4302 OR instructor permission.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the student will be prepared to:

- 1. Describe an audiogram
- 2. Identify the implications of hearing loss on individuals of all ages, including the impact of HL on speech, language, communication, social interactions, academic performance, work-place performance, psychological wellbeing, and overall quality of life
- 3. Identify optimal environmental accommodations in both classroom or work-place settings
- 4. Understand and describe the technologies used to benefit individuals with hearing loss, including hearing aids, cochlear implants, BAHAs, FM systems, & assistive listening devices
- 5. Summarize various views about hearing loss, cochlear implants, and the Deaf community
- 6. Provide examples of techniques used in aural rehabilitation, including, but not limited to, auditory training & speech reading; Discuss various modes of communication

Relationship to ASHA Standards

ASHA upholds specified standards related to academic and clinical training as well as continuing education. This course provides an introduction to the knowledge and skills of the required ASHA standards and *contributes* to the completion of the following standards:

Standard IV-B – knowledge of basic communication and swallowing processes, including the appropriate biological, neurological, acoustic, psychological, developmental, and linguistic and cultural correlates.

Course Format: This course is an asynchronous on-line course. Course material will be broken down into segments, and recorded lectures will be provided for the student's use along with assigned readings, links, materials, videos, etc. Additionally, a 1-hour "live" meeting will occur at the instructor's Personal Zoom Meeting space (https://ufl.zoom.us/meeting#/pmi/8048190176) at a time to be determined to be convenient for the majority of the class. The instructor will review discussion posts for the week and address any questions, concerns, etc. as well as any questions asked during the live meeting. Although not required, students are encouraged to attend to bolster their understanding of the concepts covered in class.

As this is an ASYNCRHONOUS ONLINE course, there is no required attendance. When attending class, students are encouraged to take handwritten notes. Although students may find it easier to take notes via a computer, research actually suggests that students who take **hand-written notes often perform better** than their classmates who use computers for taking notes.

Therefore, regardless of how you take notes (handwritten or typed), please attempt to summarize the discussion in your own words.

Discussion Board: Each week, 3-4 questions/reflection points will be posted by the instructor. Students will respond to the posed questions/reflection points and then to at least one fellow classmate. Some details/comments made may be used to facilitate the live weekly meeting/review session. 10 points each week.

Quizzes:

A brief quiz (6 to 12 questions per quiz) covering the assigned reading/lecture material provided through Canvas will be completed each week. The quizzes can be completed open-book/open-note but will have a time-limit. Additionally, students must take the quizzes <u>independently</u>. The quizzes are designed to foster preparation for the course lecture and to emphasize key aspects of week's lecture/topic. Quizzes must be completed prior to the beginning of class. Students will have 1 week to complete the quiz (from the ending of the previous class period until the start of the current topic's class period). Therefore, there will be no extension made for a missed quizzed. Please plan accordingly. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Exams: This course will have two on-line exams: one at mid-semester and one final exam. While the final exam will be cumulative, it will have a majority of materials covered during weeks 4-6. Exams will be available for a three-day period. Students can take the exam at anytime during that time period; however, students will have an allotted amount of time to complete the exam and must complete it once started. Students will need to download HonorLock (see Canvas course for details) PRIOR to taking the exam. All exams must be completed independently and without notes, textbook, etc. Each exam may include multiple-choice, T/F, matching, and/or short-answer questions, worth 100 points.

Assignments: Students will complete two "experiential" activities over the course of the class. Each activity is worth 25 points. Options will be provided, and students select which activity they will complete. A reflection (2-3 pages, double-spaced) on this experience will be submitted via Canvas. Activities might include an "ear plug" experience, closed caption experience, Deaf culture videos, etc.

Pamphlet Assignment: Students will select a topic (provided in assignment description) covered in class. Students will create a sample Pamphlet that could be used in future practice. Details and examples will be provided in Canvas assignments. Pamphlets can be trifold or single sheet, whichever the student finds works best for their selected topic. Worth 50 points.

Students Requiring Accommodations
